6. **Expertise in Drill and Ceremonial Duties:** Cadets must demonstrate advanced proficiency in drill movements, ceremonial duties, and the ability to perform and lead in various formal settings.
7. **Specialized Knowledge and Skills:** The exam may include specialized areas depending on the NCC's focus, such as navigation, first aid, survival skills, or other technical and tactical knowledge relevant to the cadet's training.
